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Education Agreement signed between Government of Yukon and Kwanlin Dün First Nation

A three-year Education Agreement has been signed by Minister of Education Tracy-Anne McPhee and Kwanlin Dün First Nation Chief Doris Bill to support Kwanlin Dün First Nation (KDFN) learners and all learners attending school on KDFN Traditional Territory. This historic agreement is the first to be signed between the Government of Yukon and KDFN.

The agreement aims to improve the educational experience and outcomes of KDFN and other students through investments in K-12 education over three years by both the Yukon government and KDFN. These investments will provide input into culturally-inclusive education programs with a particular focus on four schools in Whitehorse. KDFN will have more authority and control over the education of its citizens at these schools to increase culture and language-related learning opportunities.

The agreement includes a Cultural Educator position that will bring more First Nations culture and knowledge to students at Elijah Smith Elementary, Porter Creek Secondary, F.H. Collins Secondary as well as the Independent Learning Centre. By working with the local KDFN community, there will be enhanced exposure to Southern Tutchone language and cultural programming in Whitehorse schools.
